



TRACING OUR CLUBS "ROOTS" IN THE TRENTON AREA

The following article traces our Club's "German ethnic roots" in the Trenton area from the 19th to the 21st centuries. The article mentions some individuals affiliated with these clubs, including the Trenton Donauschwaben overtime. <u>It should be noted that there are many, many members of these clubs not mentioned that made these clubs successful.</u> Space and time did not allow for trying to mention all.

Our Club's "Roots" - A Brief History of Past German Societies in Trenton, NJ

Trenton has a long history of German American societies in and around the city. Trenton became a musical city with the large German immigrant influx in the 1840s. They brought with them singing societies. Prior to World War I there were dozens of these societies, many of them specifically with German-Hungarian (Donauschwaben) founders and membership. The main purpose of many of these groups was to cultivate German culture, provide entertainment through the formation of German singing and dance groups, sponsoring of incoming immigrants from the "Old Country" and offering of sick and death benefits to members since health and life insurance was lacking at this time. Most were situated in the Chambersburg section of Trenton, NJ. Most of the clubs started out as men's clubs only, with ladies auxiliaries added as time went on, followed by full women memberships. In 1903 a German-American Alliance was formed in order to celebrate German customs. The following year a German Day event was held at Mercer Park, followed by a parade of floats down Beatty Street to Broad Street in Trenton which ended with the playing of the Star Spangled Banner. The crowd was addressed by Mayor Frank Katzenbach and Col. E. C. Stahl, President of the Federated German Societies. Over 21 German-American Societies took part. Many of the German-American events were covered by the *Trenton Deutsche Zeitung*, (1906), Otto Erdlen, editor.

"Since we have many Americans of German extraction in this area we should justly be proud of our forefathers. Their accomplishment in building their fair share for future generations in Trenton. The list of German organizations alone will give you some insight as to the number of people that must have been active at the turn into the 20th century. This is a tribute to all the people who came and passed. During the last 200 years of our country, may God give us many more centuries of Liberty, Freedom and Justice for All. There is no other group that knows the meaning of the words Liberty, Freedom and Justice better than the German-Americans. Many of the ones that came after the Second World War to this country have spent many years in concentration Camps in Siberia and many more in Jugoslavia (sic). That country committed Genocide on its citizens of German descent." (Ethnic Bicentennial Festival "How it was 200 Years Ago" – St. Raphael Church, Trenton, NJ, no date).

Pre-World War II Clubs

The *Sängerbund* was formed in 1847 by German immigrants living in Trenton and operated to 1925. It later changed its name to the *Liedertafel Singing Society*.

The *Liederkranz* was formed in 1881 by Christian Guenther and met at Korbin Stahuber's saloon on South Broad Street and Roebling Avenue. The club celebrated its 25th Anniversary in October 1906 at the hall with over 500 in attendance. The hall was also home for a number of others in 1883 when it moved to Lovett's Hall, South Clinton Avenue and then they erected Liederkranz Hall at South Clinton Avenue, Chambersburg, Trenton in 1888. German clubs, as part owners. Their 1952-53 soccer team members were; Dave Goodwin (mother from Palanka), Tony Walter (Bukiner), Paul Walter (Bukiner), Herb Sieling (Germany), Hans Huck (Bukiner), Frank Herdt (Palanka), Joe Schön ((Palanka), Hans Kornfeld ((Palanka), Karl Paul (Yugoslavia), Joe Dingler (Germany), John Annasenz (Palanka), George Schmidt (Neudorf), Güther Junkuhn ((Germany), Adam Gauss (Filipowa), Nick Weber (Srem), Nick Wiener (Romania) and Paul Wiener (Tschalma). Most, as noted, were Donauschwaben. It celebrated its 75th Anniversary Concert and Dance in October 1956 at Aurora Hall, 145 Morris Avenue, Trenton. Members of the *Aurora Singing Society* and the *Banater Singing Society* took part in the event. The *Liederkranz* was the oldest singing society in Trenton at that time. Over 500 attended the 75th Anniversary Banquet the following weekend at Liederkranz Hall, 1218 Chambers Street. In 1962 the *Liederkranz* united with the *Aurora* to form the *German-American Society* (See further details below).**





The Aurora was founded in 1906 by German-Hungarians immigrants to the city. Its home was Padderatz Hall. It was first known as the Deutsch-Ungarische Gesellschaft. In 1912 it relocated to Division Street and Morris Avenue, Trenton. In 1924 the club expanded the hall. The founding members were; Johann Merkel, Joseph Kestner, Joseph Majofsky, Peter Wilwol, Adam Slavinyak, Martin Schmidt, Robert Milla, Peter Hiel, Otto Breyer, Joahnn Fischer and Michael Keller. 1953 saw the club burning its 48 year old mortgage at the Hall. William Everson was club president at that time and the 400 club members were joined by members of the Arbeiter, the Banater and the Liederkranz Societies. In May 1955, the club's 50th Anniversary, the only charter member alive was Peter Hiel. A two-day Anniversary event was held at Aurora Hall with members of the Banater and Arbeiter clubs in attendance. Adam Basler was president at the time and was joined by anniversary committee members; Alfred Lemke, George Wentzler, Max Schmidt, Joseph Dorner, Louis Angebrandt, George Schumacher, Joseph Stumpf, Henry Mieuburger, Nicholas Mayer, Philip Kramer, Joseph Buchs, George Duacheck, Anton Patercity, Frank Berner, Michael Trischler, Frank Straker, Victor Dedek, Joseph Feldenzer, Joseph Kuhn, William Albert, William Reich and Andrew Haumann. In the Fall of 1957, Palanka members of the club held a benefit Palanka Kirchweih dance at the Aurora for displaced WWII Palanka invalid soldiers living in Germany. Committee members included; Charles Hiel, Joseph Wolf, Joseph Schmidt, Josef Spildener, Frank Herdt, John Herdt, Joseph Bohn, Michael Schön, Joseph Schön, Martin Kornfeld, Nicholas Mayer, Franz Klespies, John Radler, Steve Brunner and John Kornfeld.

The event was held again in September 1958 at the Aurora Hall. President Adam Basler was assisted by members; Charles Hiel, Joseph Schmidt, Joseph Wolf, Joseph Schmidt, Joseph Spildener,

Frank Herdt, John Herdt, Joseph Bohn, Michael Schön, Joseph Schön, Martin Kornfeld, Nicholas Mayer, John Bratträger, John Mueller, Martin Mueller, Steve Mayer, Andy Franz, Joe Basler, Jack Zentner, Peter Kiss, John Kiss, Franz Klespies, John Radler, Joseph Horvath and John Kornfeld. The Aurora singers that night were; Frank Adelman, Joseph Dorner, George Wenzler, Arthur Lemke, Adam Basler, Frank Straker, Adam Patersity, Joseph Stumpf, Martin Schmidt, Henry Lee, Joseph A. Schmidt, Joseph Basler, Joseph Busch, Henry Pfann, Ludwig Jakober, George Stuachek, Louis Angebrandt, Joseph Wolf, William Michel, William Brech, Frank Herdt, Wendel Albert, Nicholas Schmidt, Henry Meyer, Victor Knott and Frank Berner.

In 1960, the 5th Palanka Kirchweihfest, celebrating the 205th Anniversary of the dedication of the first Roman Catholic Church in Palanka (1755), was held at the Aurora Hall. Members from the surrounding German clubs attended the event. The event committee included; Joseph Schmidt, Peter Kiss and Michael Schoen. It was held there the following year also. In 1962 the *Aurora* united with the *Liederkranz* to form the *German-American Society* (See further details below).**

Other German clubs in the Trenton area were the; East Trenton Maenner Chor (1846), the Trenton Turn Verein (1853), the Haromonie Gesang Verein (1887), the Presicher Kranken und Unterstüthetzunge Verein, Schwäbischer Volksfestverein Trenton,, Saint Francis Pioneer Corps (1876), Mendelssohn Chor Union (1882) Gesanfcerinin Celilia Singing Society (1889), the Württembergischer Unterstützungsverein, the Hessenischer Kranken und Unterstützungsverein, the Deutscher Katholischer Frauen Verein, Nord Deutscher Unterstützungsverein, the Arbeiter Männer und Damenchor (also the Sick and Death Benefit Society formed 1909), the Badischer Kranken Unterstützungsverein, the Deutscher Landwehverein, the Banater Gesang Verein (1915-1994) and the Banater Sick and Death Benefit Society (1923), the Ersten Paripaser Einjahrign Kranken Unterstützungs (1914), the Loge Cherusker Trenton, the Cannstatter Volksfestverin Trenton, the Börn Unterstützungsverein, the Martha Washington Lodge, the Social Turnverein Trenton, the Jacob Nabinger Association, the Deutscher Central Verein, the Katholischer Central Verein, and the Bayern Verein Trenton, Badenia. All a piece of history now. **

The *Arbeiter*, located on the Franklin Street, Trenton was formed in 1909 by a small group of German-Hungarian immigrants. It originally went under the name, *Deutche-Sud Ungarischer Liedertafel*. They met at first at a various feetal halls in Trenton. Its first No. 100 of the contract of the contrac



President was Josef Piffath and its first home was Kestner Hall at Woodland and Daylon Streets, Trenton. It later became the *Arbeiter Männer und Damen Chor* (also the Sick and Death Benefit Society formed 1909). The club joined the Worker's Federation of Singing Societies of America in 1920. In 1922, as the club grew and purchased the old Holmdel School building at 151 Franklin Street as their clubhouse and catering hall. In 1928 it was remodeled and expanded and added the Ratskeller.

During the two World Wars "public opinion often caused problems that had to be met tactfully and graciously". In spite of those issues the club continued to grow.

Some additional members of the late 1940s members included; Herrman Thoma, Paul Gesser, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob (bar tender) and Theresa Helleis Bauer, Sr., Jacob Bauer, Jr., Mr. and Mrs. Charles and Theresa Hemmert Bauer, Mr. and Mrs. Matthew and Jean Tott Bauer, Mr. and Mrs. Frank and Katie Maas Helleis, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew (band and chorus) and Barbara Helleis Majofsky and Mr. and Mrs. Leon and Elsie Bauer Penrith. Michael Mausz was president for 10 years in the from 1940-50. Paul Gesser served as chore director for over 18 years.

A fire caused extensive damage to the hall in 1955. Unfortunately, the fire destroyed many of the club's historical records, including a list charter members and early members. The hall was repaired and reopened thereafter.

The 1956 officers included; Joseph Feldenzer, Emil Bambach, Ernest Dehne, Ludwig Agnes, Heinrich Meyer, Michael Mausz, Mrs. Mary McKeever, Mrs. Eva Genovay, Mrs. Charles Bauer, and Mrs. John Engelberger. Past presidents included: Joseph Piffath, Mathias Schaefer, Joseph Mutter, Stephan Rauner, Hermann Janatsch, John Flesch, Jack Berner, John Engelberger, Bangrath Flesch, Emil Bambach, Michael Mausz, Joseph Feldenzer, Ernest Plaag, August Imhof, Heinrich Sawadski and Andre Toner. Some past lady presidents included; Mrs. Mary McKeever Trischler, Mrs. Ann Hilsdorf, Mrs. Elizabeth Kapp, Mrs. Mary Brunn, Mrs. Gertrude Liese and Mrs. Louise Schwartz. The club was affiliated with the *Nord Östlicher Sängerbund* and the *United Singers of Philadelphia*. Marian and Katherine Metternek Dlubak were caretakers at the facility in the 1970s. Donauschwaben Joseph Mueller was the last president of the club. Due to declining membership and little interest from the younger generation it was officially disbanded in 2012. ***

The Ersten Paripaser Einjahrign Kranken Unterstützungs (First Year Paripas Workmen Sick and Death Benefit Society) was founded in 1914 by immigrants from the town Paripas/Parabutsch, Batschka, Austria-Hungary. The club met at Arbeiter Hall in 1954 for their 40th Anniversary. Paul Hahn was the President in 1954. There were over 256 member at this time. The *Karl Roebling Unit, Steuben Society* was formed by American citizens of German descent, desiring to assist in civic betterment in the United States and joined the main organization *The Steuben Society* of 1919. The name was chosen in honor of American Revolutionary War hero Baron von Steuben. The Trenton affiliate was established in 1923, and was known as *the Karl G. Roebling Unit No. 393*. It is named in honor of Karl G. Roebling, grandson of Trenton's famous bridge builder John A. Roebling of this city. It began with a charter membership of 74 members. Karl Weidel, .Sr., was the first chairman and the other original officers were: Albert E. Schoeller, secretary; August Muehlhausen, treasurer; Charles Kessler, vice-chairman; Fred Pferd and Fred Gaertner, vice-chairmen; Hilmar Mueller and Carl Sandhoff, trustees.**

Trenton Banater Gesang Herein 340 WILLIAM STREET, TRENTON, NEW JERSEY

The *Banater Singing Society* was formed in 1923 and meet at Michael Bier's home at 340 Williams Street, Trenton. Later it met at Padderatz Hall. Anton Gusz was its first President. The next president was Nicholas Weissgarber. In 1926 the club purchased the Bier property at 340 Williams Street and named it Banater Hall. The charter members included; Michael Bier, Nicholas Schmidt, Eva Kitterstock, Michael Stosz, Martin Lenhardt, Joseph Mausz, Nicholas Schulder and Joseph Mohler. Other members were Martin and Theresa Busch Angebranndt, Victor Louis and Mary Adeline Knott. The 1956 officers included; Joseph Zimmer, Anton Hollendonner, Peter Hiel, John Berg and George Lord. The last President of the club was Barbara Basler. The Banater is no longer operating now.**

Our *Trenton Donauschwaben* was established in 1956 as a "Hilfsverein" (help society) in order to assist newly arrived German American immigrants from Europe. Prior to 1956, the newly arrived Donauschwaben to Trenton would gather at the *Arbeiter*, *Liederkranz*, and *Banater* and *Aurora* clubs. The founding Donauschwaben fathers were; Jakob Fleith of Chalma, Josef Bohn of Palanka, Jakob Eppli of Bukin, Stefan Reger of Filipowa, Stefan Mattes of Filipowa, Franz Klespies of Palanka, Sebastian Gauss of Filipowa, Josef Schmidt of Palanka, Johann Bretträger of Ilok, Josef Wolf of Palanka, Wilhelm Schmidt of Palanka, Josef Spildener of Palanka, Franz Herdt of Palanka, Karl Paul of Werbass, Josef Stiller of Obrowatz and Josef Relinger of Palanka. The club's first meetings were held in St. Stephen's Hall in Trenton and at several members' homes/farms. Our past Presidents include: Jakob Fleith (from Chalma), Lester Lindenmeyer, Jakob Eppli (from Bukin), Willie Michel (from Neudorf), Adam Martini (from Bukin), Ludwig Jakober (from Neudorf), Franz Herdt (from Trenton), Harold Parr (from Trenton) and present President Joseph Brandecker (from Trenton).

In 1957 the Fraüenschaft (ladies auxiliary) was begun under the leadership of Helene Lindenmayer, Hilda Schintzler, Rosa Wildmann, Josefa Metternek Brandecker and Eva Mayer Martini. They were famous for their schnitzel, sauerbraten, sarma (stuffed cabbage) and many other ethnic dishes and dessert. Ulli Haller and Helga Kusenko lead the bakery team over the ages. The bratwurst preparation for the two annual Schlachtfest dinners and two pig roasts were left up to the men of the club. Bratwurst pre-prep helpers included; Jacob Bauer, Jim Brunner, Willie Hepp, Dan Penrith, Tony Walter, Uwe Hundskopf and Hermann Volltrauer. The "Bratwurst Boys" were lead by Heinrich Pfann back in the day, then Ludwig Jakober, followed by Chris Carson, Al Tindall, Steve Brandecker and Chuck Pinkerton over the years. The pig roast crew included; Ludwig Jakob, Jim Brunner, Rick Jakober, Mark Gruzlovic, Harold Parr and Andrew LaRue. Our German ethnic meals were offered to members and friends monthly and for special catered events. The dinners remain the main fund raiser for the club. Under the direction of Kim, Sofi and Emma Walter and others.






Dubs in the Shrubs Campout and Car Show

In 1959 the club members, Helene Lindenmayer and Jakob Eppli started our children's German language school at the Aurora and then at the St. Stephen's Parish Center, Genesee Street in Trenton and Red Man's Hall in Clinton Street. Monica Stern also helped out for a bit. By 1970, its heyday, there were over 75 children enrolled in the school with children ranging from 8th grade to high school ages. The club had <u>four</u> classrooms full of young students. Leaders at that time included Margit Bischof and Ingeborg Wolf with help from Mark Novosel, Sylvia Magnus, Ruth Saik, Emmi Hartmann and Uta Langon in 1976. Christmas plays were on the agenda including those held at Arbeiter Hall. In the 1990s the children's school was reborn under the direction of Liz Tindall, Kathy Herdt Tozzi, Monica Martini Gottfried, and then Brigitte Kleinmann and finally Eva Martini and Brittany Brandecker lead the children's school until the Covid19 Pandemic hit in 2020. The group performed at our annual Mother's Day dinner Anniversary Dinner and St. Nikolausfeier event each December. Singing at our events is usually lead by the Martini sisters, Anna, Luisa and Christina and also dad, Hans Martini.

In the Fall of 1960, the club held its 4th Donauschwaben song and dance fest. Over 1,200 persons attended the Saturday event held at the Polish-American Club in Yardville, NJ. The event celebrated the Donauschwabens escape from the Yugoslav communist and the freedom they found in America. Ethnic German Songs and dances were performed by club member youth and adults dressed in their native costumes. German club groups from Elizabeth, New Brunswick and Newark, NJ also attended. Commissioner Donal Connelly and Helen Lindenmayer opened the event. The event committee included; Jakob Eppli, Sebastian Gauss, Ludwig Jakober, Nick Schmidt, Lester Lindenmayer, Joseph Brandecker, H. Weinburger, Jacob Fleith, Joseph Bohn, Joseph Bretträger, Jacob Pilger, Stephan Mathias, Joseph Spildener, John Baumgartner, Joseph Schlaff, Helen Lindenmayer, Mrs. Jakob Eppli, Mrs. Nick Schmidt, Mrs. Joseph Brandecker, Mrs. Joseph Bretträger, Mrs. Joseph Pilger, Mrs. Catherine Mueller, Mrs. Catherine Schlaff, Mrs. Sebastian Gauss, Mrs. Jacob Fleith, Mrs. H. Neuburger and Mrs. Ann Spieldener.

In the 1960s the club children were organized into a Tanz Gruppe (dance group). The group grew in the 70s, its heyday, under the direction of Marlene Novosel and Ludwig Jakober. In the 1980s the youth dance group performed in Milwaukee, Washington, DC, New York, and at the German Heritage Festival in Holmdel, NJ. The group re-organized in the 1990s and joined with the Philadelphia Donauschwaben dance group have performed at numerous DonauschwabenFest all over North America.

In 1973 under Club President Willie Michel leadership the club members self-financed (between \$500-1000 each) the purchased a 100 year old farmhouse at Broad Street and Rt. 156 in Yardville, NJ (outside Trenton) and renovated it into the present day clubhouse. They were paid back by the mid-1990s for their "loan". It was across the street from St. Elizabeth's Home (1944) for unwed mothers, run by Catholic German- American sisters and regular attendees at the club's monthly dinners. Today the tradition (prep, cooking, baking, serving and bar service) continue by both our lady, men and youth members.

In the 1970s the *United German-American Committee of Great Trenton* was formed by the *Trenton Donauschwaben*, the *German-American*, the *Banater* and the *Arbeiter* under the direction of Ted Hierl. The Committee held an annual "four club" picnic each year that was held at the *German-American* picnic grove.

An adult German language school was added in the 1980s with teachers over the years including; Lore Hanks, Silva Magnus, Louis Romolo, Dr. Kurt Müller, Ryan Kramer, Andy Franz and Christa Tindall Pullion. Unfortunately, the classes stopped in the early 2000s. However, in 2021 the club went virtual and students are now enrolled at the Bucks County Community College under Christa Tindall Pullion's instruction.

Club news was spread by word of mouth back in the day. Our late Jacob Eppli even spread the news when selling his eggs in the club member neighborhoods of Trenton. In the 1970s, Adam and Eva Mayer Martini spread the club news by publishing it in the "Der Heimatbote" newspaper out of Toronto, Canada. This was followed by news announcements published by Monica Martini Gottfried, Kathy Herdt Tozzi and Monica Kusenko Yob in the "Junge Menschen" in the 1970s. The late Otto and Edith Kraus kept the members updated of events throughout the 1980s. In the 1980s the club, under Hans Martini editorship, created its own newsletter called the "Wir Donauschwaben" In the 1990s the newsletter changed its name to the "Trentoner Donauschwaben Nachrichten" and is published quarterly by Editor/V.P. Dennis J. Bauer with help from Hans Martini, Liz Tindall and Melanie Brandecker and others. The newsletter contains club news, announcements, events, quarterly highlights, sponsorships and often includes personal experiences/history authored by members like, the late Adam Martini, the late Jacob Bauer, the late Jim Lieblang and Andy Franz. Over the past several years member Liz Tindall started a weekly club e-newsletter which goes out on-line to hundreds of subscribers. The club news is spread worldwide, not bad from the old fashion "word of mouth" that only reached a dozen or so individuals to now reaching hundreds of individuals via the Internet.

Club news was also announced Sundays on the radio out of Trenton on the "Ted and Rudy" German radio Show (Ted Hierl and Rudy Stumpf). Ted also organized the annual German Heritage Festival at the Garden State Arts Center in Holmdel, NJ starting in the 1970s on in to the 21st Century, until several years ago. It featured German cultural themes, food, entertainment, etc. Hundreds of folks from PA, NJ and NY showed up to support the event. The *Trenton Donauschwaben* and *German-American Society* were active participates at the fest.

In 1999 the club went joined the World Wide Web under Dana Miles with the creation of our own web page (www.trentondonauschwaben.com). Members Dennis J. Bauer, Terry Penrith, Joe Brandecker, Jr. and Tom Rubino fine-tuned the site over the years. The club also has a Facebook page for the club and one for the Euro-American Auto Show maintained by Dennis J. Bauer and Joe Brandecker, Jr. The club started hosting an annual Euro-American Auto and Cycle Show with the German-American Society at their picnic grove in 2004 with great success. Proceeds support the club's student scholarship fund. The car show committee includes; Terry Huff, Pat Huff, Colin Huff, Dennis J. Bauer, Joe Brandecker, Joe Vecchione, Steve Brandecker and Melanie Brandecker.

The club held its 25th and 50th Anniversaries off site at the Arbeiter Hall in Trenton, in 1981 and 2006. Our 60th Anniversary was held at the *German-American* Aurora Hall in 2016. Members continue to attend the annual Donauschwabentreffens held throughout North American each summer and support/hold cultural events in the East with sister clubs; the *Philadelphia Donauschwaben* and the *United German-Hungarians*.

The club had to re-invent our monthly dinners in 2020-2021 due to the Covid19 Pandemic restrictions. We went to pre-order drive through pickup of dinners to great success thanks to our dinner staff and diners.

Of note, our membership includes not only members of Donauschwaben and German ancestry, but those of all ethnicities with an interest in German culture and enjoy German foods and drink.

"Finding our Past" under the direction of member Dennis J. Bauer began in the 1990s. The club has held a number genealogy courses/seminars over the years on the history of the Donauschwaben and their roots at several public events and at the club for its members. In 2003 the club joined the newly formed *Donauschwaben Villages Helping Hands* organization (www.dvhh.org) and its web site. This organization's goal is to be a resource for those researching their Donauschwaben roots. Many of the club's historical articles by members are posted on their web page for all to read. Club members Hans Martini and Dennis J. Bauer have served as board members of the *DVHH*. Members Eva and Adam Martini were very active in the initial years of the *DVHH* also.

Several of our present day Donauschwaben member's ancestors were members of some of the Pre-WWII German clubs of the past and have continued the cultural traditions onto today. Our Donauschwaben member's roots go back to the Batschka, Banat, and the Srem/Croatia areas of the former Austria-Hungary (1867-1918). Membership ancestral hometowns include, but are not limited to; Apatin, Batsch, Batschsentiwan, Bukin, Csatalia, Filipowa, Futak, Gajdobra, Hodschag, Kernei, Neudorf, Obrowatz, Palanka, Parabutsh, Plavna, Starcevo, Satnitz, Siroko Polje, Stanischitsch, Tscheb, Weprowatz, etc. Membership family historical surnames include but are not limited to; Basler, Bauer, Beck, Beer, Bohn, Bohnert, Brandecker, Drobnek, Eisele, Eppli, Franz, Frey, Friedrich, Guth, Grumbier, Haupert, Hepp, Herdt, Helleis, Hiel, Horvath, Huhn, Jakober, Kanape, Kernast, Kiss, Klespies, Kornfeld, Lang, Lieblang, Maas, Mayer, Martini, Metternek, Mikkelson, Novosel, Paul, Pfann, Radler, Rohrbacher, Scherer, Schmidt, Schoen, Spildener, Stiller, Straka, Stettner, Teichmann, Wagner, Walter, Wilwohl, Wolf, Zentner, to name a few.**



GERMAN-AMERICAN SOCIETY

The *German-American Society* of Trenton, NJ was founded in 1962 by the merger of the *Liederkranz* (1881), then President Josef Dinger, and the *Aurora* (1905), then President Adam Basler. It operated out of the Aurora Building, Division Street and Morris Avenue. Many Donauschwaben joined this club. It later built and moved to their present day clubhouse and catering hall at Uncles Pete's Road, Yardville, NJ in 1969. Many of the club's presidents were Donauschwaben, including Stefan Mattes, Nick Wiener, Joseph Thiel, Joseph Koch and present President Kathy Hoenisch.

The year 1969 saw the last of the important milestones in the history of *German-American Society* come true. It was decided to pool all human and financial resources and build a new clubhouse with the necessary soccer field and picnic grounds. Groundbreaking took place on October 10, 1969. The grounds, consisting of 18 acres, had been purchased previously (through membership shares). Two years later, through the combined efforts and diligent work of many dedicated and loyal club members, the *German American Society* finally had a new permanent home . . . on Uncle Pete's Road. The club also built several soccer fields for its *German American Kickers* soccer teams and a wooded picnic grove, Biergarten and two outdoor kitchen stands to hold club functions. The club has hosted many joint local German-American clubs events and picnics over the years.

In 1992 the club opened its full membership to women for the first time. Until then they could only be active in the club as part of the Ladies Auxiliary. In 2004 the club joined with the *Trenton Donauschwaben* to hold an annual Euro-American Auto and Cycle Show at the club's picnic grove with great success.

Today the *German American Society* is the center of many activities and social functions, not only for its own membership, but do to its attractive and well maintained appearance and its generous size, to many outside organizations as well. While soccer is dominating the sport scene with several boy's and girl's teams as well as a men's team, the club's inner activities range from dancing and mixed choir instructions to a German language class. The club continues to supports events of the nearby *Trenton Donauschwaben* and vice-versa, including the joint Euro-American Auto Show, This club remains active into 2021.**
